Abdul Razak, in his blog yesterday, said the budget, to be tabled on Oct 23, will continue to provide opportunities for higher education and skills training so that they have stable and better jobs.

Malaysian economic situation and raised concerns among certain sections of society.

"In this context, the B40 households are the most easily affected and in need of job stability and higher income to meet the costs of education, house ownership and cost of living," he said.

Najib said he would submit ideas from the people, obtained through crowdsourcing for the Budget 2016 campaign, to the Finance Ministry for comprehensive evaluation.

Many of those who provided suggestions during the campaign, held from Sept 1 to 18, had asked the government to help ease their daily burden, particularly of those in the low-income group.

"There were also suggestions for the government to not only improve the public transportation network in Kuala Lumpur and the Klang Valley but also invest in new KTM or LRT projects in the urban centres in the other states," he said.

Meanwhile, in his opening remarks at the 27th MSC Malaysia Implementation Council Meeting in Putrajaya, Najib said there is a growing need for the nation to address the issue of talent gap in the information and communications technology (ICT) sector.

For Malaysia to build a vibrant digital economy, he said it is critical to develop world-class ICT talent to meet growing technological demand and digital infrastructure for seamless connectivity.

"It is imperative for Malaysian youth to be digitally savvy and in this digital era, more emphasis is needed to give our students a head start in digital literacy skills and computational thinking such as coding and programming.
